"Mariyana Spyropoulos is an environmentalist, attorney and entrepreneur. I am proud to appoint her to this important position," said Governor Quinn. "She will protect our waterways, which are among the Land of Lincoln's most vital natural resources."

A member of the Sierra Club, Spryopoulos received her J.D. from John Marshall Law School and served as a criminal prosecutor before opening her own law firm. She also has a Master's degree in business from Loyola University. (Background Information).

The Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago treats wastewater from domestic, commercial, and industrial sources in Chicago and numerous surrounding communities.

"I want to thank Governor Quinn for this important appointment. I look forward to serving on the district board as it works toward ensuring quality community health and a safe water supply for everyone," said Spyropoulos.

Established in 1889, the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago operates the world's largest wastewater treatment agency, the Stickney Water Reclamation Plant. It also operates the Chicago Sanitary and Ship Canal, the Tunnel Reservoir Plan, and one of the largest civil engineering projects ever undertaken, the Tunnel and Reservoir Plan, better known as the "Deep Tunnel Project."

According to studio estimates issued on Sunday, "G.I. Joe: The Rise of Cobra" sold about \$56.2 million worth of tickets during its first three days since opening on Friday, the fourth-biggest August debut of all time.

The Hillsborough County medical examiner's office released the results of its autopsy on Friday, finding that cocaine use had contributed to the heart disease that suddenly killed the 50-year-old in June. He was discovered by his wife in bed at their Tampa condo the morning of June 28.

# Russia detains ship 'hijackers'

The ship's disappearance confounded experts for weeks

Eight people have been arrested for hijacking the cargo ship Arctic Sea, Russia's defence minister says.

Anatoly Serdyukov said the group of suspects included Russian, Estonian and Latvian nationals.

The Arctic Sea, laden with timber, disappeared after passing through the English Channel in late July. It was found on Sunday off West Africa.

Speculation about what happened to the ship included suggestions of piracy, a mafia dispute or a commercial row.

The ship's owners had reported that the vessel was attacked on 24 July in Swedish waters.

The hijackers had approached the Arctic Sea in a dinghy, claiming they needed help to repair their vessel, Russia's Interfax news agency quoted Mr Serdyukov as saying.

But once on board the cargo ship, they threatened the crew with guns and forced them to sail south, the defence minister said. Second attack?

The suspects include four Estonians, two Latvians and two Russians.

What happened to the Arctic Sea?

Mr Serdyukov said an investigation was under way aboard the Russian warship Ladny, where the Arctic Sea's 15-strong crew members and the suspected pirates were being questioned.

The Ladny joined the hunt for the missing ship last week after Moscow deployed the strength of its Atlantic fleet to find the Maltese-flagged ship.

Malta's Maritime Security Committee says it continued to track the ship after it was reported missing.

"There was census amongst the investigating authorities of Finland, Malta and Sweden not to disclose any sensitive information, in order not to jeopardise the life and safety of the persons on board and the integrity of the ship," the committee said in a statement on Tuesday.

Carrying timber reportedly worth \$1.8m

(£1.1m), the 4,000-tonne Arctic Sea sailed from Finland and had been scheduled to dock in the Algerian port of Bejaia on 4



August

The crew reported having been boarded by up to 10 armed men as the ship sailed through the Baltic Sea, but the intruders were reported to have left the vessel on an inflatable boat after 12 hours.

Ransom demand

There are also reports of the ship having been attacked a second time off the Portuguese coast.

However, the vessel's operators said they had no knowledge of the incident and Portugal said the ship was never in its territorial waters.

Before eing found, the last known contact with the crew was when the Arctic Sea reported to British maritime authorities in Dover as it passed through the busy shipping waters of the English Channel.

It was then sighted in the Bay of Biscay on 30 July.

Last weekend, a multinational investigation was launched after police in Finland said a ransom demand had been made, while emphasising that they could not confirm its authenticity.

The Arctic Sea was eventually found on Sunday night 300 miles (480 km) off Cape Verde in the Atlantic Ocean.

The Maltese authorities say they are now trying to ensure that the Arctic Sea is granted a safe berth "to allow for the required investigations into the seaworthi-

## Methane seeps from Arctic sea bed

Methane bubbles observed by sonar, escape from sea bed as temperatures rise

Scientists say they have evidence that the powerful greenhouse gas methane is escaping from the Arctic sea bed.Researchers say this could be evidence of a predicted positive feedback effect of climate change. As temperatures rise, the sea bed grows warmer and frozen water crystals in the sediment break down, allowing methane trapped inside them to escape.

The research team found that more than 250 plumes of methane bubbles are rising from the sea bed off Norway. The joint British and German research team detected the bubbles using a type of sonar normally used to search for shoals of fish. Once detected, the bubbles were sampled and tested for methane at a range of depths. Writing in Geophysical Research Letters, the team says the methane was rising from an area of sea bed off West Spitsbergen, from depths between 150 and 400m. The gas is normally trapped as "methane hydrate" in sediment under the ocean floor.

METHANE HYDRATES

Methane gas is trapped inside crystal structure of water ice. The gas is released when the ice melts, normally at 0C.At higher ressure ie under the ocean, hydrates are stable at higher temperatures. "Methane hydrate" is an ice-like substance composed of water and methane which is stable under conditions of high pressure and low temperature. As temperatures rise, the hydrate breaks down. So this new evidence shows that methane is stable at water depths greater than 400m off Spitsbergen. However data collected over 30 years shows it was then stable at water depths as shallow as 360m.

#### Ocean has warmed

Temperature records show that this area of the ocean has warmed by 1C during the same period. The research was carried out as part of the International Polar Year Initiative, funded by Britain's Natural Environment Research Council (NERC). The team says this is the first time that this loss of stability associated with temperature rise has been observed during the current geological period. Professor Tim Minshull of the National Oceanography Centre at Southampton told BBC News: "We already knew there was some methane hydrate in the ocean off Spitsbergen and that's an area where climate change is happening rather faster than just about anywhere else in the world."

Nearer the surface the hydrate breaks down as temperatures rise and the methane is released. Gas rises from the sea bed in plumes of bubbles - most of it dissolves before it reaches the surface. So far scientists haven't detected methane breaking the ocean surface but they don't rule out the possibility. "There's been an idea for a long time that if the oceans warm, methane might be released from hydrate beneath the sea floor and generate a positive greenhouse effect." "What we're trying to do is to use lots of different techniques to assess whether this was something that was likely to happen in a relatively short time scale off Spitsbergen. "However methane is already released from ocean floor hydrates at higher temperatures and lower pressures - so the team also suggest that some methane release may have been going on in this area since the last ice age.

#### Significant discovery

Their most significant finding is that climate change means the gas is being released from more and deeper areas of the Arctic ocean.

Professor Minshull said: "Our survey was designed to work out how much methane might be released by future ocean warming; we did not expect to discover such strong evidence that this process has already started."

FinMin: Econ crisis highlights need for reforms



Prime Minister Costas Karamanlis met on Tuesday with Economy and Finance Minister Yiannis Papathanassiou at his Maximos Mansion office. After the meeting, Papathanassiou said the ongoing global economic crisis has not left the Greek economy unaffected. The consequences, nevertheless, are milder than those in other economies, although the current crisis has again brought to the surface the Greek economy's structural problems.

"Our duty is to present and implement a programme of reforms aiming for the development and creation of more and better paying positions ... We must do what hasn't been done in the last decade," the FinMin said.

#### Preserving eponymous Lake Stymphalia

Lake Stymphalia in the northeast Peloponnese is a well-known wetland of heightened ecological importance for the local region, one included in the European Union's Natura 2000 programme for the conservation of fauna and flora.

Stymphalia, located in Corinth prefecture, is the only mountainous lake in the Peloponnese, Greece eponymous southernmost province. Surrounded by Mt. Kyllini (Zireia), Mt. Oligyrtos, Mt. Mavrovounio and Mt. Garrias, the wetland is rich in bird, amphibian and plant life, and is a very important refuge and breeding ground for migratory birds, including 133 species of protected fowl and birds threatened with extinction. It is also home to the endemic fish taxom Pseudophoxinums stymphalicus. This species is quite interesting, because during dry periods it survives by sinking into the lake's mud and forming a slippery 'envelope' around its body.

During the Roman era, the lake supplied water to ancient Corinth some 65 kilometers away through an aqueduct constructed during the reign of Emperor Hadrian. Parts of the ancient aqueduct are still visible today.

On its north shore lie the remnants of ancient Stymphalos.


In Greek mythology, Lake Stymphalos is the site of Hercules' sixth labour, namely, to slay the man-eating Stymphalian birds (Stymphalides), pets of Ares, the god of war. The mythological creatures fled to the lake to escape a pack of wolves and bred quickly, taking over the countryside and destroying the area's crops and fruit trees.

The local government of the modern-day town of Stymphalia has launched a campaign to preserve the lake and the entire area's wetlands environment.

#### **Bounced checks rise in July**

Credit conditions reportedly worsened in the local market last month, with the number of bounced checks reaching 30,342 and totalling 296.49 million euros, official figures showed on Monday.



In the January-July period, the number of bounced checks reached 196,431, totalling 1.954


#### **Observatory in Grevena**

### Trade deficit drops in May 2009



Greece's trade deficit dropped by 4.2 billion euros in May 2009 (yr-yr) to stand at 11.6 billion euros, according to figures released here on Monday by Eurostat.

Specifically, exports reached 5.8 billion euros, while imports totaled 17.4 billion, thereby slashing the deficit from 15.8 billion to 11.6 billion euros, in relation to the corresponding month of 2008.



When travelling in Greece, nature-loving tourists are offered the opportunity to:


- to wander in aesthetic forests or explore national parks not merely in the mountainous regions of the mainland, but also on certain islands or in the proximity of rivers and lakes




# People 'get happier as they age'

Older people appear better able to control their emotions

Most people get happier as they grow older, studies on people aged up to their mid-90s suggest.

Despite worries about ill health, income, changes in social status and bereavements, later life tends to be a golden age, according to psychologists.



They found older adults generally make the best of the time they have left and have learned to avoid situations that make them feel sad or stressed. The young should do the same, they told the American Psychological Association.

The UK is an ageing nation - in less than 25 years, one in four people in the UK will be over 65 and the number of over-85s will have doubled. And it is expected there will be 30,000 people aged over 100 by the year 2030.

According to University of California psychologist Dr Susan Turk Charles, this should make the UK a happier society. By reviewing the available studies on emotions and ageing she found that mental wellbeing generally improved with age, except for people with dementia-related ill health.

Work carried out by Dr Laura Carstensen, a psychology professor at Stanford University, suggested why this might be the case.

Dr Carstensen asked volunteers ranging in age from 18 to mid-90s to take part in various experiments and keep diaries of their emotional state.

She found the older people were far less likely than the younger to experience persistent negative moods and were more resilient to hearing personal criticism.

They were also much better at controlling and balancing their emotions - a skill that appeared to improve the older they became.

#### TIPS FOR A HAPPY OLD AGE

Envisage ways to thoroughly enjoy the years ahead and imagine living to a healthy and happy 100. Design your life and daily routines to reinforce this goal. Don't put all your "social" eggs in one basket - invest time outside of your family and career too

Dr Charles explained: "Based on work by Carstensen and her colleagues, we know that older people are increasingly aware that the time they have left in life is growing shorter.

"They want to make the best of it so they avoid engaging in situations that will make them unhappy. "They have also had more time to learn and understand the intentions of others which helps them to avoid these stressful situations."

Dr Carstensen said the young would do well to start preparing for their old age now.

This includes adopting a healthy daily routine and ensuring some social investment is spent outside of the workplace and family home.

Andrew Harrop, head of public policy at Age Concern and Help the Aged, said the findings were encouraging. "For many people, older age and later life is often looked upon with dread and worry."

Far too many younger people assume that getting older is a process that will inevitably mean sickness, frailty and lack of mobility and greater dependence. However, this is far from the truth in very many cases.

Many older people lead active, healthy lives enriched by experience and learning.

This positive advantage can be brought to bear across so many aspects of daily life which - in turn - hugely benefits our ageing society.

It's vital that there is growing acceptance that just because someone is getting older, it doesn't mean they no longer have a significant contribution to make. This study is one of many which shows that later life can be a enormously positive experience.

#### Pakistan Taliban spokesman 'held'

Pakistan's army has arrested a man it believes to be the chief spokesman for the country's Taliban, officials say.

Maulvi Omar was a spokesman for the Tehrik Taliban Pakistan (TTP), one of the main Taliban groups in the country.

He was reportedly picked up in the Mohmand tribal area close to the border with Afghanistan, while travelling in a



car with two associates.

Mr Omar is said to have been a key aide of Taliban leader Baitullah Mehsud, thought to have been killed recently.

Pakistani officials say they will produce Mr Omar before journalists later on Tuesday. "A very, very important militant has been arrested," Maj Fazal Ur Rehman told the AFP news agency.

Despite that statement, correspondents say Maulvi Omar's importance has diminished in recent weeks because of army advances in his stronghold of Bajaur, in north-western Pakistan.

His arrest came as a senior Pakistani army officer said that it would take months to prepare an offensive against the Taliban in South Waziristan, where they are strongest.

Lt Gen Nadeem Ahmed was speaking after briefing the visiting US envoy to Afghanistan and Pakistan, Richard Holbrooke.He said the army was short of "the right kind of equipment" in the offensive against militants in the northwest.

<u>Problems remain</u> The arrest follows a

concerted military offensive against the Taliban in the Swat valley region of Pakistan's North West Frontier Province.

Maulvi Omar comes from Bajaur, a tribal area in the North West where the Taliban established themselves early on.

Pakistani security forces have clashed with militants recently in nearby Mohmand, which is currently controlled by the Taliban.

The BBC's Aleem Maqbool, in Islamabad, says Maulvi Omar's detention will be seen as another success for the Pakistani military.

He was a senior aide to Baitullah Mehsud, and Pakistan will be hoping the removal of key leadership figures will plunge the Taliban into disarray, our correspondent says.

They are already on the back foot with the defeat in Swat and the reported death of Baitullah Mehsud, head of the organization.

Despite denials, there has been no clear proof yet from the Taliban that their leader is still alive.

While Maulvi Umar's position is not as vital, he is remains of significance primarily for two reasons.

He has been acting as a liaison between the various Taliban groups to settle differences.

Maulvi Umar also had strong connections in the media, and was a key figure in the Taliban's propaganda campaigns.

Correspondents say that his arrest may provide key information about the Taliban's recent operations and especially the mystery surrounding the status of Baitullah Mehsud.

Islamabad and Washington say Baitullah Mehsud was killed in a US drone attack earlier this month.

Nevertheless, the infrastructure through which militants have been recruited and trained remains in place.

There has been a surge of violence in the north-west since the army launched a summer operation to dislodge Taliban militants from their strongholds there.

### China reduces holdings in US debt

China wants to establish a new global currency regime. China reduced its holdings of US government debt by the largest margin in nearly nine years in June, according to data from the US Treasury. China holds more US government debt than any other country and cut its holdings of US securities by more that 3% in June, said the BBC's Chris Hogg. Japan and the UK - second and third largest holders of US debt - increased their holdings over the same period.

China's holding of US debt is about 7% higher than at the turn of the year. <u>Inflation fear</u>

In recent months the US government's budget deficit has widened thanks in part to the Obama administration's costly stimulus plan.

Our correspondent in Shanghai says that China is worried about this, and fears the stimulus efforts will fuel inflation in the US, reducing the value of the dollar.

This would then erode the value of the debt China holds in the US currency. In June, China cut its holdings of US securities by about \$25bn, a fall of 3.1%. 'Dollar alternative'

The sales were made as the US treasury secretary was visiting Beijing to try to reassure the Chinese that their investment in his country's government debt is safe. In 2008, the Chinese increased their holdings in US debt by 52% over 12 months.

"China has said it would like to establish an alternative to the US dollar as the world's favoured currency for foreign exchange reserves," said our correspondent.
