Faith, love and dedication are the foundation that SS. Constantine and Helen Greek Orthodox Church were built upon and the reasons that we celebrate one hundred years of an ever-thriving community. The strength and longevity of the church has been through the devotion, dedication



and perseverance of the leadership and the synergy of priests, parish council and parishioners.

The origin of the Saints Constantine and Helen Greek Orthodox Parish began with services being held at a rented hall at 63rd and Woodlawn Ave. It was at a meeting held on April 25, 1909, that 350 people voted to establish an independent church dedicated to Saints Constantine and Helen. The first church was built at 61st and Michigan and opened its doors in October of 1910. A fire destroyed the church on Holy Monday April 26, 1926. Holv week services were held at neighborhood churches of other Christian denominations and it was during the Easter Sunday services that the announcement that a new church would be built at the same location brought the community hope. The church has relocated twice since, 1948 to 74th and Stony Island Avenue and 1976 to 111th and Roberts Road. In 1961, Father Byron was assigned with Presvytera Cynthia to SS. Constantine and Helen. His years of love in Christ and the parish of SS. Constantine and Helen have unified the voices of the parish and have fortified the spiritual bonds interlocking the lives of many. In 2007, the town of Palos Hills named a portion of Roberts Road in Fr. Byron Papanikolaou with Fr. Nichoas W. honor of Fr. Byron, showing the respect that Jonas he has earned throughout the entire community. Fifty years of dedication, devotion and love to the church and its parishioners has earned Fr. Byron a special place in the hearts of those he has ministered to.

The following was written by Ben Stein and recited by him on CBS Sunday Morning Commentary.

My confession:

I am a Jew, and every single one of my ancestors was Jewish. And it does not bother me even a little bit when people call those beautiful lit up, bejeweled trees, Christmas trees. I don't feel threatened. I don't feel discriminated against. That's what they are, Christmas trees.

It doesn't bother me a bit when people say, 'Merry Christmas' to me. I don't think they are slighting me or getting ready to put me in a ghetto. In fact, I kind of like it. It shows that we are all brothers and sisters celebrating this happy time of year. It doesn't bother me at all that there is a manger scene on display at a key intersection near my beach house in Malibu. If people want a creche, it's just as fine with me as is the Menorah a few hundred yards away.

I don't like getting pushed around for being a Jew, and I don't think Christians like getting pushed around for being Christians. I think people who believe in God are sick and tired of getting pushed around, period. I have no idea where the concept came from, that America is an explicitly atheist country. I can't find it in the Constitution and I don't like it being shoved down my throat.

Or maybe I can put it another way: where did the idea come from that we should worship celebrities and we aren't allowed to worship God as we understand Him? I guess that's a sign that I'm getting old, too. But there are a lot of us who are wondering where these celebrities came from and where the America we knew went to.

In light of the many jokes we send to one another for a laugh, this is a little different: This is not intended to be a joke; it's not funny, it's intended to get you thinking.

Billy Graham's daughter was interviewed on the Early Show and Jane Clayson asked her 'How could God let something like this happen?' (regarding Hurricane Katrina).. Anne Graham gave an extremely profound and insightful response. She said, 'I believe God is deeply

saddened by this, just as we are, but for years we've been telling God to get out of our schools, to get out of our government and to get out of our lives.. And being the gentleman He is, I believe He has calmly backed out. How can we expect God to give us His blessing and His protection if we demand He leave us alone?'

In light of recent events... terrorists attack, school shootings, etc. I think it started when Madeleine Murray O'Hare (she was murdered, her body found a few years ago) complained she didn't want prayer in our schools, and we said OK. Then someone said you better not read the Bible in school. The Bible says thou shalt not kill; thou shalt not steal, and love your neighbor as yourself. And we said OK.

Then Dr. Benjamin Spock said we shouldn't spank our children when they misbehave, because their little personalities would be warped and we might damage their selfesteem (Dr. Spock's son committed suicide). We said an expert should know what he's talking about. And we said okay. Now we're asking ourselves why our children have no conscience, why they don't know right from wrong, and why it doesn't bother them to kill strangers, their classmates, and themselves..

Probably, if we think about it long and hard enough, we can figure it out. I think it has a great deal to do with 'WE REAP WHAT WE SOW.'

Funny how simple it is for people to trash God and then wonder why the world's going to hell. Funny how we believe what the newspapers say, but question what the Bible says. Funny how you can send 'jokes' through email and they spread like wildfire, but when you start sending messages regarding the Lord, people think twice about sharing. Funny how lewd, crude, vulgar and obscene articles pass freely through cyberspace, but public discussion of God is suppressed in the school and workplace. I Only hope we find GOD again before it is too late ! Funny how we can be more worried about what other people think of us than what God thinks of us.

The war effort by Quentin Tarantino and Brad Pitt has paid off as their history lesson "Inglourious Basterds" claimed victory at the box office with a \$37.6 million debut. "Inglourious Basterds" features Pitt and an international ensemble in a sprawling tale of Jewish commandos and a plot to take out Nazi leaders at a movie premiere during World War II.



A raging wildfire raced down a mountain slope in Greece toward the town of Marathon recently, nearing two ancient temples while despairing residents pleaded for firefighters and equipment that were nowhere to be seen. Tens of thousands of residents of Athens' northern suburbs evacuated their homes, fleeing in cars or on foot. Several houses were destroyed as the fire advanced across an area more than 31 miles (50 kilometers) wide. The Athens fire began on Mt. Penteli, which divides Athens from the Marathon plain, and has spread down both sides of the mountain.

Police were called for the second time in three months to the Hollywood Hills home of actress Lindsay Lohan on Sunday to investigate a reported burglary there, a police spokesman said. The latest call came in at about 6:30 a.m. local time, but the spokesman at the Los Angeles Police Department's Hollywood station said he had no further details, including who made the call or whether Lohan was home at the time.

Milla Jovovich has wed her "Resident Evil" director, Paul W. S. Anderson, according to People. The couple, who met in 2002 on the set of the film, reportedly tied the knot at their Los Angeles home in a sunset ceremony. Milla, 33, and Paul, 44, welcomed daughter Ever Gabo in 2006.

Despite speculation, Anna Paquin is "not pregnant," her rep confirms to Usmagazine.com. Blogs have been guessing the True Blood actress is expecting after she was spotted wearing a baggy dress in Beverly Hills Wednesday. Paquin, 27, will soon get practice at being a mother, though. Her fiance, costar Stephen Moyer, 39, is dad to Lilac, 5, and Billy, 8, from prior relationships. The remains of a former model whose killing set off an international manhunt for a reality television star were so badly mutilated that investigators had to use the serial numbers on her breast implants to identify her. The man charged with Jasmine Fiore's murder, reality TV show contestant Ryan Alexander Jenkins, committed suicide. Her nude body had been found that morning, stuffed in a bloodstained suitcase in a trash bin in Buena Park, an Orange County city about 20 miles southeast of Los Angeles, but authorities wouldn't be able to identify her for a few more days.Detectives tracked the serial number on the implants because they could not use fingerprints or dental records, said Farrah Emami, a spokeswoman for the Orange County district attorney's office.Run Golf Club in Vernon Hills.

The horror tale "The Final Destination" debuted as the No. 1 movie with \$28.3 million, according to studio estimates. The Warner Bros. sequel is the latest installment in the franchise about people stalked by death after a premonition saves them from their destined demise. "Final Destination" took over the top spot from Quentin Tarantino and Brad Pitt's World War II saga "Inglourious Basterds," which slipped to second place with \$20 million. The Weinstein Co. release raised its total to \$73.8 million after 10 days in theaters. Though Hollywood's summer season historically does not end until Labor Day, the holiday comes late this year, adding an extra week to the movie schedule and skewing comparisons to past summers.

NEW YORK NBC's "Today" show has hired someone with White House experience as a new correspondent former first daughter Jenna Bush Hager. Hager, a 27-year-old teacher in Baltimore, will contribute stories about once a month on issues like education to television's top-rated morning news show, said Jim Bell, its executive producer. The daughter of former President George W. Bush said she has always wanted to be a teacher and a writer, and has already authored two books. But she was intrigued by the idea of getting into television when Bell contacted her.

Authorities will need to conduct toxicology tests, expected to take weeks, to determine what killed celebrity disc jockey DJ AM, a medical examiner's office spokeswoman said Saturday. DJ AM, whose real name was Adam Goldstein, had openly discussed past addictions to crack cocaine, Ecstasy and other drugs. In October, MTV was to debut his reality show, "Gone Too Far," in which he and concerned families staged interventions for drug abusers. MTV hasn't said whether Goldstein's show will air.

Oasis guitarist Noel Gallagher claims "verbal and violent intimidation" led to his decision to leave the "Britpop" band. The posting says "the level of verbal and violent intimidation towards me, my family, friends and comrades has become intolerable." Gallagher offers no details about what the intimidation was, and doesn't specify who was responsible.

The Office's John Krasinski will walk down the aisle both on- and off-screen. Krasinski and British actress Emily Blunt (The Devil Wears Prada) are engaged, according to People. They have been dating since November 2008. The couple kept their relationship quiet, attending the 2009 SAG Awards separately and only going on low-key dates, according to the magazine. More than a year after splitting from her husband following his affair with her best friend, Shania Twain took to her official site to tell fans she's doing great and to announce her new relationship. On Friday night, the country singer's 44th birthday, she posted a personal letter and a 15-minute video travelogue of her most memorable moments from the past year. The star split from her husband, Robert "Mutt" Lange in May 2008 after he had an affair with her longtime best friend, Marie-Anne Thiebaud, who also managed the couple's chateau in Switzerland.

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
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FR. BYRON STYLIANOS PAPANIKOLAOU CELEBRATES 50 YEARS OF SERVICE IN THE VINEYARD OF OUR LORD

Father Byron Papanikolaou was born on August 24, 1933, in Dasilion Kozani, Greece. After his elementary schooling in the village he attended two years at the legendary Tsotiliou High School and two years in the Fourth Male High School in Thessaloniki. In 1951, his family emigrated to the United States where he completed his schooling at Lincoln High School, Milwaukee, graduating in June of 1954. In September of 1954 under the spiritual guidance of Archbishop Ezekiel (then Bishop of



Chicago) and Father Emmanuel Vergis, he commenced studies at the Holy Cross Greek Orthodox School of Theology. He graduated cum laude with the degree of Master of Theology in June of 1960, and as the valedictorian of his class.

Following his marriage to Xanthippi Kassou on September 11, 1960, he was ordained to the deaconate on September 25, 1960 and then to the priesthood on October 2, 1960 by His Grace Bishop Athenagoras Kokkinakis Titular Bishop of Elaia. He was immediately assigned to the parish of Saints Constantine and Helen of **Chicago as Assistant Pastor** marking the beginning of his dynamic ministry. With his elevation to Pastor in 1965, Father Byron accepted the formidable responsibility and challenges arising from his growing Church community. His administrative talents were demonstrated in the completion of the Byzantine

interior of the Church edifice on the South Shore and the construction of a new School building. The most trying period of his priesthood, truly earned him the reputation of having extreme "ipomoni" (patience), came during the transitional years in the Church's relocation to Palos Hills, Illinois.

During this period of activity, Father Byron and Presvytera Xanthippi brought up three outstanding children: Sultana, now married to George Tsokolas; Evans; and Aristotle married to Konstantia Tolios. Sultana graduated from Depaul University in Chicago, Evans is a Master of Economics from the University of Chicago, and Aristotle is a Doctor of Theology from the University of Chicago, has been a professor at the Holy Cross Greek Orthodox School of Theology in Brookline, Massachusetts, and is currently Associate Professor at Fordham University in New York. Six grandchildren, Thano (of blessed memory), Byron Stylianos, Athanasios, and Eleni Tsokolas and Byron Theodore and Alexander Panagiotis Papanikolaou, have extended the circle of love bringing much happiness to Father Byron and his family. For the rich, many faceted dedication and enthusiasm that he gave to the Church and for the service to the faithful, His Eminence Archbishop Iakovos elevated him to the title of Sakellarios in 1962, to the title of Oikonomos in 1967, and to Protopresbyter in 1974, the highest title that a married priest can attain. He was awarded the honor of being selected the keynote speaker at the "Priestly Ministry Lectureship" by the Holy Cross Greek Orthodox School of Theology in Brookline, Massachusetts and he was presented the Cross of the Holy Sepulchre from His Beatitude Diodoros, Patriarch of Jerusalem. During the 75th Anniversary of Saints Constantine and Helen he was awarded the Medal of St. Paul and given the title of Protopresbyter of the Ecumenical Throne by Archbishop Iakovos in 1985. His All Holiness Patriarch Demetrios during his historic visit to Chicago bestowed upon Father Byron the Cross of the Ecumenical Patriarchate.

Finds unearthed at necropolis in Pella shed light on social status of warriors

ANA-MPA/Distinguished citizens in antiquity occupied the most privileged place even after death, based on findings unearthed during this year's archaeological digs at the ancient necropolis of Archontiko, in northern Pella prefecture, northwest of the port city of Thessaloniki.

The excavations, conducted by the 17th ephorate of prehistoric and classical antiquities, focused on 50 tombs in the western cemetery of the ancient settlement.

Ten of the 24 tombs, dated to the Archaic



Period (580-480 BC), are believed to have belonged to aristocrat warriors. Based on the findings, the specific tombs are positioned along two paths that crossed each other, confirming that the "best" spots in pre-Classical cemeteries were reserved for the tombs of the wealthy and members of the aristocrat class.

Moreover, the deceased were buried based on their social class while members of the same family were buried close to each, other forming clusters dating back to the second half of the 7th century BC (late Iron Age) and even down to the early Hellenistic era.

Based on the findings, archaeologists believe the advance of the Macedon kingdom to the Axios River region had taken place much earlier than anticipated and not after the Persian Wars, as maintained by most archeologists until recently.

More robust trading and evident prosperity comes from evidence dated to just after the reign of King Alcetas (early fifth century BC) with the population having increased access to luxury items as a result of trade relations forged with numerous states in the Mediterranean Basin. ANA-MPA/S

Karamanlis says economy must be shielded

The world economic crisis is not over yet while dangers still exist and what is important is to shield the economy by taking the proper measures in order to protect jobs and the economically weak populations, Prime Minister Costas Karamanlis said in Brussels late Thursday night.

Addressing reporters at the end of an informal European Union Summit that focused on shaping a common European position in view of the September G20 Summit, the Greek premier said that what is needed is formulating an economic strategy with perspective and realism, the stabilising of public finances and, as regards Greece in particular, the promotion of structural reforms.

Karamanlis enumerated the six basic sectors on which the EU must place emphasis: The restructuring of the credit system, the restructuring of the role of the International Monetary Fund (IMF), the promotion of a responsible practice of remunerations in the sector of credit, the avoidance of protectionism in trade and the conclusion of an agreement in the Doha round, the reform in the system of represantation and management of the IMF, the greater support towards poorer countries and reaching an agreement at the Copenhagen Conference next December on climate change.

Regarding the issue of climate change, Karamanlis underlined that Greece wishes the conclusion of an agreement in Copenhagen and remains steadfast on increasing efforts for the decrease of emissions worldwide. He said that Greece is in favour of reforms regarding the IMF noting however that there is no need for big changes in the organisation's board.

Regarding control of the banking system, the Greek premier said that he supported the increase in international supervision, more transparency and fixing limits regarding salaries in the credit sector.

Responding to a relevant question on main opposition PASOK leader's position on the Burgas-Alexandroupoli oil pipeline, Karamanlsi said that "the country's signature cannot and must not be questioned," adding that the completion of the project of the pipleine is particularly important for national Greek interests.



PASOK leader visits IKA facilities

Main opposition PASOK leader George Papandreou said that on October 5, the day after general elections in Greece, "we will put an end to the decline of the public social security system", speaking during a visit to the IKA state social security foundation informatics center.

He charged that mismanagement, wasteful spending, corruption, lack of computerisation and arrangements favorable to banks have put IKA "in the red".

Papandreou pledged a "dignified and fair minimum pension for everyone", and a "viable social security system for everyone, and especially the young generation".

Earlier, Papandreou had visited the IKA branch in the Zographou district of Athens, where he was briefed by doctors and staff on the problems in the sector.

Privatised OA goals outlined

A new era will be inaugurated for Olympic Airlines beginning on Oct. 1 as the formerly state-run and debt-ridden air carrier will be turned over to the Marfin Investment Group (MIG) following a recent privatisation, MIG chief executive Andreas Vgenopoulos said on Thursday.

Outlining the new air carrier's business plan, the high-profile Greek business executive announced that the new OA fleet will comprise a total 21 top-of-the-line passenger jets, namely, 16 Airbus 319s and 320s, 10 Bombardier Q400s, five Bombardier Dash 100s and one ATR-42.

Vgenopoulos pledged that the new company will provide excellent service, be highly competitive and execute 65 pct of the old OA flight itinerary in accordance with provisions set by the EU. It will also claim less profitable routes and eye cooperation with a handful of international carriers that he listed off.

Conversely, he categorically ruled out the likelihood of agreeing to jointly manage OA with the Greek state and reiterated his proposal for an immediate re-nationalisation of the company if that is the wish of any new government that will take office after the Oct. 4 election.



FDIs up 165% in 2008

Foreign direct investments in Greece totaled 5.09 billion US dollars in 2008, up 165 percent compared with the previous year, UNCTAD said in its World Investment Report 2009.

The report, presented in Athens, said Greece ranked 49th, among 206 countries, in 2008, sharply improving its position from 73rd in 2007, while the United States, France, China, Britain and Russia were top in the world table.

Foreign direct investment outflows totaled 2.65 billion US dollars in 2008, down 50 pct from 2007, with Greece ranking 39th. among 158 countries, down from 37th in 2007. The US, France, Germany, Japan and UK topped the list. FDI inflow reserves as a percentage of GDP was 10.3 pct in Greece last year, down from 17 pct in 2007, and sharply down compared with a 35.1 pct average rate in the EU. Greece ranked 57th among 206 countries. FDI outflow reserves as a percentage of GDP was 9.1 pct in 2008, down from 10.1 pct in 2007 and 44.2 pct in the EU. Greece ranked 36th among 153 countries. UCTAD said that mergers and acquisitions in Greece totaled 6.04 billion US dollars last year, while takeovers totaled 2.63 US dollars, with Deutsche Telekom's purchase of OTE ranking 51st globally in 2008. Global FDI flows were negatively affected by a global financial and economic crisis last year, with inflows expected to fall from 1.7 trillion US dollars in 2008 to less than 1.2 trillion in 2009, with a recover expected around 1.4 trillion US dollars in 2010.

A TRIBUTE FOR VENETTE ASKOUNIS



Venette Askounes played a major role in the settling of Greek immigrants in Chicago during the immediate post World War II years of the late 1940s, 1950s and 1960s. She worked for The Immigrants' Protective League from the early 1930s to 1962.

She was born in Filiatra, Messinea Greece in 1909 and never forgot her Greek roots, always identifying and understanding the newcomers' struggles when they arrived under The Displaced Persons and Refugee Relief Acts of the 1950s. Mrs. Askounes was proactive and sincere with her efforts to provide the necessary immigration, naturalization and social services to the newly arrived immigrant and those with student, visitor and medical visas. She made them feel welcomed to Chicago and provided opportunities for them to socialize by organizing events at Hull House on Halsted Street and with The Greek Committee to aid The Immigrants' Protective League. These opportunities enabled the newcomers to be in touch with one another and remain proud of their background and the cultural fabric of the places from where they immigrated: the village, the province or the island.

Venette Askounes worked closely with organizations, professionals and non-professionals who were in need of information regarding the legal and social responsibilities for the welfare of immigrants and their families. She emphasized the importance of reuniting families. Through her work several thousand immigrants arrived in Chicago. When it was necessary for potential immigrants to arrive and there were no sponsors, housing or employment, she was resourceful in coordinating efforts with both the Greek and American business leaders, as well as community agencies to fulfill the obligations for the immigrants' arrival. She was successful in appealing to the best instincts of the Greek people to contribute toward assisting others. Even though the Greek population began to relocate from the Greektown area to various parts of Chicago and the suburbs, most of them would return to Venette Askounes and The Immigrants' Protective League when services were needed. As a result of this post war era of the mass arrival of Greek immigrants to Chicago and Illinois the general population and Greektown were revitalized and experienced a renaissance. An important and historical impact was made by this Greek population, followed by their children and grandchildren with their cultural, professional, educational, entrepreneurial and religious contributions to the growth, development and progress of Chicago and Illinois. Mrs. Askounes always remained interested in the plight and needs of the immigrant until her death in November, 1994.



Science fiction may be closer to reality than fantasy.

Renowned physicist Dr Michio Kaku says that the world of science fiction may be closer to reality than fantasy.

So if you thought that invisibility cloaks, time travel and teleportation were for the silver screen only, think again.

Dr Kaku is a theoretical physicist and the co-founder of string field theory, a branch of string theory, often referred to as "the theory of everything".

In his recent published book, Physics of the Impossible, he considers the phenomena of science fiction, including time travel and invisibility.

He was shocked to find that almost all of them were consistent with the known laws of physics.

According to Dr Kaku, most of what we see on the silver screen is possible - it is just

atomic scale - no Captain Kirks have been beamed up.

"Remember Captain Kirk consists of 50 trillion cells, so a human being will take many centuries."

But Star Trek takes place in the 23rd Century. "That's enough time for us to teleport a human," he says.

So far, the silver screen has been quite accurate, except when it comes to robots, says Dr Kaku.

In fact, he says Hollywood has misled us into thinking that smart robots are just around the corner.

Fans of the emotional Sonny from I-Robot, or the depressed and bored Marvin from The Hitchiker's Guide to the Galaxy, may be disappointed to hear that they are more likely to find a cockroach composing a symphony or writing a poem than a robot.

"Stupid cockroaches are smarter than our robots," says Dr Kaku.

Invisibility has long been a hallmark of science fiction or fantasy.

Star Trek spacecraft use invisibility shields, and Harry Potter would have struggled in his battle against Lord Voldemort without his invisibility cloak.

But could invisibility really be future science fact rather than science fiction?

Fiction to fact

Physics optics books used to teach that invisibility was impossible. But Dr Kaku says this is wrong; it is possible.

But he concedes that there are currently technical obstacles with the Harry Potter invisibility cloak that may hold it back from wide uptake.

For example, to be able to see out of the cloak, he says, you would need to drill two holes.

But then you would see a pair of disembodied eyes floating in mid-air, which might ruin the look. Or lack of a look.

And what about teleportation?

Stupid cockroaches are smarter than our robots.

Dr Kaku points out, this has already been done on an atomic scale.

The world record for teleportation is 600m. Properties of photons - particles of light - have already been teleported across the River Danube and he predicts that we will be teleporting molecules within the decade, and eventually to the moon. Russian President Dmitry Medvedev has welcomed as "positive" the US decision to shelve controversial missile defence bases in Poland and the Czech Republic.

Mr Medvedev said there were now "good conditions" for US-Russia talks on tackling missile proliferation.

US President Barack Obama had earlier announced there would be a shift in US missile defence strategy, following a review of the threat posed by Iran. Russian Prime Minister Vladimir Putin said it was a "correct and brave" move. However, US Republicans have called the decision "short-sighted" and "harmful".

Some said it was a concession to Moscow with nothing in return. Russia had long objected to plans pursued by the administration of former-President George W Bush to base a missile interceptor system close to its borders, calling it a threat to its security. It would be hard to invent a news story that tied together more strategic and political issues than the Obama administration's decision to change its stance on the deployment of a missile defence shield in Eastern Europe. It touches on Washington's assessment of Iran's military capabilities. There is an underlying assumption that Tehran's capacity for mounting warheads on long-range missiles does not pose an immediate strategic headache.

It also sends a signal to the peoples of Central Europe about how President Barack Obama proposes to manage the post Cold War order in their neck of the woods in the next few years. And it raises questions about the administration's much-talked-about desire to "hit the reset" button on its relationship with Russia.

Will overhaul benefit US?

Mr Bush had argued the system was to defend against missiles from "rogue states" like Iran. Mr Obama ordered a review on taking office earlier this year.In Thursday he said that new intelligence had shown Iran was pursuing short-range and medium-range missile development, rather than long-range. He said the US therefore needed a "proven, cost-effective" system that would use land- and sea-based interceptors against the evolving threat. The US "no longer planned to move forward" with the old shield scheme, the White House said.

In an address on Russian television, Mr Medvedev said Mr Obama was "correcting" the US approach to missile defence. Mr Medvedev said that he and Mr Obama had in earlier meetings expressed the need to work together to assess the risks of missile proliferation. "The statement made in Washington today shows that quite good conditions are evolving for such work," Mr Medvedev said.

<u>'Hopeful signal'</u>

The two countries are currently in talks about reducing their nuclear stockpiles. Now is the time when we should look to strengthen our defences, and those of our allies. Mr Medvedev said he would discuss the issues with Mr Obama during a visit to the United Nations in New York next week. The US move was also welcomed by German Chancellor Angela Merkel. "I see the decision today as a very hopeful signal that we can overcome the difficulties with Russia and develop a united front to counter the threat of Iran," she said.

However, Republicans in the US have condemned Mr Obama's move. Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell said it was "short-sighted and harmful to our long-term security interests". Defeated presidential candidate John McCain called the decision "seriously misguided". "Given the serious and growing threats posed by Iran's missile and nuclear programmes, now is the time when we should look to strengthen our defences, and those of our allies.

But Democratic House Speaker Nancy Pelosi said the decision was "brilliant" and clearly based on an accurate summary of the current threats. The missile shield in question was first confirmed in August 2008, when the US signed a deal with Poland to site 10 interceptors at a base near the Baltic Sea, and with the Czech Republic to build a radar station on its territory. On Thursday Mr Obama said the review he had ordered had shown the threat from Iran had altered. There was now a need for a more flexible approach to provide "a stronger, smarter and swifter defence" of US and allied forces in Europe.

Defence Secretary Robert Gates said the first phase of the new strategy would be to deploy "current and proven missile defence systems in the next two years", including the sea-based Aegis and SM-3 interceptors. BBC defence and security correspondent Nick Childs says the new US strategy is based on mobility and flexibility. Proven defence systems will be based first on warships and then on land, and will be upgraded over the next decade, he says. Mr Gates stressed the US was not abandoning missile defence of Europe. He said negotiations were under way with both Poland and the Czech Republic about deploying upgraded SM-3 interceptors from 2015.
